APPLICATIONS FOR 2022-23 IN LIGHT OF COVID-19 – Evidence of Religious Practice

We would like to reassure all parents and carers that we are very conscious of the present situation and its effect on this aspect of our Admissions Policy, as lockdown has closed churches and thus has implication for the over-subscription criteria within St Edward's Admission Policy.

In light of this, we have been able to amend our 2022-23 Admissions Policy to reflect the closure of churches as follows:

In the event that during the period specified for attendance at worship the church (or, in relation to those of other faiths, relevant place of worship) has been closed for public worship and has not provided alternative premises for that worship, the requirements of (these) admission arrangements in relation to attendance will only apply to the period when the church (or in relation to those of other faiths, relevant place of worship) or alternative premises have been available for public worship.

The applications window for a place in our school from September 2022 opens on 1st September 2021 and the Supplementary Information Form will be available from that date. Copies can be found on the school's website, the BCP Council website and in hard copy from our main reception.

Reflection -

When someone dies, someone we know well, someone with whom we have shared so much, there can often be a sense of disbelief; the idea that the person is no more can seem impossible.

Some deep internal sense of denial can emerge. That instinctual sense is often articulated in one way or another in the Old Testament Scriptures.

The passage from the Gospel of Mark which we have today is a clear presentation of the rightness of that instinct in the form of miracles which leaves no doubt about the authority of Jesus as Lord of life.

The two miracle stories linked here – the woman with the haemorrhage and the resuscitation of Jairus' daughter – are very deliberately fitted together by Mark.

The two subjects – one a young girl of twelve years and the other an older woman who has been suffering for twelve years, are virtually beyond help – the older woman has suffered long and has had treatment for many years from many doctors and yet is steadily declining. The young girl who was very sick when Jairus sought Jesus' help has now died.

But the really important common factor for both is the need of faith: 'If I can touch even his clothes, I shall be well again'. And indeed, she is: 'your faith has restored you to health'. When Jesus is on the way to the house, the message arrives that the child has died: 'Do not be afraid, only have faith'.

Nonetheless we are told that after seeing the child get up, those in the house with Jesus -his three disciples and the child's parents – were overcome with astonishment. Similarly, when the older woman is healed, she hesitates to acknowledge it publicly until Jesus challenges her

Mark does not suggest that these great miracles alter the basic disposition of those affected, faith may be an essential element for the Lord to work, but it does not eradicate the human hesitancy and uncertainty which is part of human mortality.

All those who gather for the Eucharist this Sunday do so precisely as people of faith, and yet all will acknowledge the inadequacy of that faith – and today's Gospel will not berate them for that.
